From Cheryl Thurber about *The Poison Book Project* at *Winterthur Museum*, *Garden & Library*.

Dr. Rosie Grayburn, and Dr. Melissa Tedone are trying to share this information as broadly as possible to those who regularly handle books bound during the Victorian period:

Research at *Winterthur Museum, Garden & Library* has revealed the use of toxic, arsenic-based, "emerald green" pigment (copper acetoarsenite) to color vivid green bookcloth on Victorian-era cloth case bindings. *The Poison Book Project* investigates potentially toxic bookcloth pigments and explores safe handling and storage guidelines for these materials. To aid library staff and patrons, private collectors, and book dealers who may not have access to analytical equipment, Winterthur has printed emerald green color swatch bookmarks to assist with visual identification of bookcloth which may be arsenical. Grayburn's and Tedone's plans for archival research in England to investigate mid-nineteenth century bookcloth manufacture and the relationships among particular binderies and bookcloth manufacturers have been put on hold by the pandemic, but as they plan for happier days, they welcome this group's knowledgeable advice should you have leads to recommend. They're familiar with William Tomlinson's seminal work in this area, but the Winterbottom Book Cloth

Company was established a couple of decades later than the period that truly interests us (1840s-1850s).
