From Rebecca Romney: Announcing the Honey & Wax Prize

This morning we announced the winner of the 2022 Honey & Wax Prize, an annual award of \$1000 for an outstanding book collection conceived and built by a young woman in the US.

Our winner is Melanie Shi, whose collection "East of France, West of Russia: Cold War Europe and the Chinese Book" argued that "the history of postwar Europe can be told through the Chinese book."

This was Shi's second time applying to the prize; she received an honorable mention in 2021, with a collection of cross-cultural books published and purchased by the Chinese diaspora in New York City. This latest collection reflects the energetic scouting, keen eye, and habits of inquiry Shi honed in Chinatown, but it is more ambitious in every way. Her collection reflects an awareness of multiple angles of each book: the text, the

translation, the physical object, the publishers, the readers, the political context. Whether "China," as an idea, is serving as shorthand for "Communism" in Eastern Bloc countries, or as an imperial fantasy represented by "sumptuous novels from the Ming and Qing dynasties" in France, Shi makes a compelling case for the role these books played in postwar debates about Western power.

The Grolier Club: Building the Book from the Ancient World to the Present Day: Five Decades of Rare Book School & the Book Arts Press
28 September-23 December 2022

The Grolier Club 47 East 60th Street, New York, NY 10022 Ground Floor Gallery

The Grolier Club presents a special exhibition that details how books have been produced throughout history and across various regions of the globe. Organized by Rare Book School at the University of Virginia and drawn from their unique collections, *Building the Book from the Ancient World to the Present Day: Five Decades of Rare Book School & the Book Arts Press* will be on view in the Grolier Club's ground floor gallery from 28 September through 23 December 2022. The exhibition celebrates the international institute—founded by MacArthur Fellow Terry Belanger and currently directed by Michael F. Suarez, S.J.—that brings together curators, librarians, book historians, conservators, and collectors from around the world to teach and learn about books as physical objects.

Curated by Barbara Heritage (Associate Director & Curator of Collections, Rare Book School) and Ruth-Ellen St. Onge (Associate Curator & Special Collections Librarian, Rare Book School), *Building the Book* features more than 200 items that illustrate the changing forms of the book over more than two millennia. The exhibition is a deep dive into the materials, printing technologies, decorative finishes, and markings that make books, such as the substrates (or surfaces) that give books their physical forms, ranging from ancient cuneiform tablets and papyrus to the composite screens of e-readers of today; to printing type, plates, and woodblocks; and bookbindings that declare a book's identity to the world.

"We have all been taught how to read books, but have we learned how to look at them closely? What can be gleaned from analyzing an original specimen of ancient papyrus, or by studying rubbings of a Chinese book engraved on stone, or by feeling the heft of a piece of beech once used in a European medieval bookbinding?," said co-curator Barbara Heritage.

"The more we learn to look at books as objects, the more we understand how their material forms are expressive not only of their manufacture, but also of the myriad communities and social networks from which they emerge—whether an ancient Egyptian farm, an early modern Tibetan monastery, a nineteenth-century prairie schoolhouse, or a turn-of-the-millennium Canadian home with its own desktop computer," said co-curator Ruth-Ellen St. Onge.

Publication & Public Programs

Accompanying the exhibition is a new publication, *Building the Book from the Ancient World to the Present Day: How Manuscript, Printed, and Digital Texts Are Made. Illustrated from the Teaching Collections of Rare Book School at the University of Virginia.* Published by The Legacy Press and distributed by the University of Virginia Press, the book will be available in October 2022.

The Grolier Club will host related in-person public programs, including lunchtime exhibition tours, led by co-curators Barbara Heritage and Ruth-Ellen St. Onge, on Wednesday, 28 September 2022 and Friday, 14 October 2022, both 1–2 p.m. ET; a guided tour of the Asian books in the exhibition by RBS faculty member Soren Edgren, along with a Chinese calligraphy demonstration by Weiguo Yu, on Saturday, 15 October 2022, 2–4 p.m. ET; a symposium on "Building the Book" on Friday, 4 November 2022, 9 a.m.–5 p.m. ET (speakers and more details to be announced); and a virtual exhibition tour, followed by a Q&A with Barbara Heritage and Ruth-Ellen St. Onge, on Wednesday, 7 December 2022 at 6–7:30 p.m. ET.

Item Not Found: Accounting for Loss in Libraries, Archives and Other Heritage and Memory Organizations

A Virtual Conference Organized by UCLA Center for 17th- and 18th-Century Studies/William Andrews Clark Memorial Library and Oakland University Libraries March 8-9, 2023 12-4pm Eastern

Keynote Speakers:

Tamar Evangelestia-Dougherty, Director, Smithsonian Libraries and Archives T-Kay Sangwand, Librarian for Digital Collection Development, UCLA, and Gabriel Solís, Executive Director, Texas After Violence Project

This virtual conference considers the ongoing reassessment of memory and heritage work and heritage ownership, as it is understood by libraries, archives and related organizations, through an examination of the multiple meanings, complexities, and resonances of loss. As an inevitable reality of heritage preservation--saving everything is an impossibility--a nuanced understanding of the fundamental role of loss is an important counterpart to these organizations' work towards preservation, permanence and sustainability.

Once seen as static evidence of the past, heritage is now recognized as the subject of ongoing reinterpretation, maintenance, and negotiation for those living in the present. Collectors are increasingly willing to confront processes of repatriation, reparation and restitution, and other forms of deaccessioning, and vocabularies of ownership are giving way to those of stewardship, custody, and post-custody. At the same time, heightened attention to sustainable practices is also encouraging a reassessment of longstanding assumptions about collection development and preservation, challenging the model of limitless expansion, growth and permanence as a primary measure of success. Cultural memory and heritage workers, too, face many other kinds of loss within and beyond the workplace that impacts their labor, including loss of resources, safety nets, and colleagues. What is heritage and cultural property, and to whom do they belong? Who owns the past, and what does such ownership mean? Is it possible for acts of past injustice to result in cooperativerelationship-building for the future? How can a sustained interrogation of collection and heritage loss be productively leveraged to reckon with other kinds of loss in the cultural memory and heritage workspace? We seek to explore these and other related questions during this two-day conference.

The conference is free and open to the public; advance registration is required.

We invite presentation proposals from diverse perspectives on a range of topics including, but not limited to, the following:

- -Theft, repatriation, virtual reunification, shared print/collection development
- -Deaccessioning, redirections, removals
- -Endangered archives, postcustodial archival practice
- -Approaches to loss in preservation and conservation
- -Human and resource loss in and beyond the workplace
- -Other related aspects of practice and research

We encourage proposals from librarians, archivists, curators, conservators, scholars, museum professionals, students, and other stakeholders at any point in their careers, from institutions and organizations of all sizes, and including independent researchers.

The conference organizers welcome proposals for presentations in a variety of virtual formats. For questions, please feel free to contact us below.

A modest honorarium is available; University of California affiliates and international presenters are not eligible for the honorarium.
